From Our Rector: Rector's Message, Ash Wednesday and Thank You

The Message



Have you noticed that the days are slowly getting longer? Sunrise comes earlier each day and sunset a little later. I welcome the longer days with great anticipation each year. This increasing light takes place for us during the season of Epiphany. The season of Epiphany is about the light that shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. We affirm this light in the person of Jesus Christ our Lord in the words of the Nicene Creed, "eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God..." The Collect for the Second Sunday after

the Epiphany says it this way, "Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ is the light of the world: Grant that your people, illumined by your Word and Sacraments, may shine with the radiance of Christ's glory...". It is walking in the light of this faith that strengthens and upholds us through the joys and trials of life.

As we journey through this season watching the days grow longer and the promise of Spring beginning to push up through the earth, we are suddenly plunged into the darkness of Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent with these words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Jesus, the Light of the world, after his baptism by John is driven into the wilderness for forty days and nights. There he faces the trials and temptations of life and wrestles with the devil. Jesus faced his temptations, the darkness that tried to overcome the light, and emerged prepared to face anything, even death itself upon the cross. Lent calls us to examine our own lives by carrying the light of our faith into the dark recesses of our past. Name the things that weigh you down, face the issues that separate you from your sisters and brothers, and the things that separates you from God; wrestle with them until the light that shines in the darkness overcomes them and brings you to repentance and to a new and renewed life. Yes, life is hard and we often find ourselves being tempted by pride, envy, lust, jealousy, prejudice, resentment, and so on. These are the things that bring

darkness into our otherwise bright and joyful lives. Christ gives us the tools to overcome them by loving us where we are and for who we are; children of God and heirs of eternal life. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." (John 1:5)

May that light guide you through the dark days of Lent to your Easter joy.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday this year is on February 17th. The Bishop's office has already announced that because infection and death rates from the novel Coronavirus continue to increase, in-person gatherings for worship on Ash Wednesday 2021 will not be possible; noting that one cannot impose ashes in a public setting while maintaining six feet of distance.

Worshippers may receive the ashes in their own household settings during an on-line service. Any baptized persons may place the ashes on the foreheads of others in their households, or on their own foreheads. One does not have to be ordained or licensed to impose ashes on others or on themselves. I will be recording the service and preparing the ashes the week prior to Ash Wednesday. When the ashes are ready I will send an email explaining when you can come by the parish hall and pick some up or if you need them mailed to you, please email me at stucwood@gmail.com

Thank you, Jeff Loustaunau, for all your attention to the many church issues and for taking the lead on the Narthex project. Thanks to Bob Guillotte on this project as well. We thank other church members for their help also. A special thanks to the Geek Squad and the Fellowship Hall repair group. Thanks to the Building and Grounds Committee for past and future attention to maintenance issues which are posted on the Vestry bulletin board. Building and

Grounds will meet in February to update repair priorities and budget concerns.

Narthex repairs are underway. A construction entrance has been completed. The rotten door jams, trim and nailers have been removed and are in the process of being replaced. The plaster has been removed 4 feet up and the brick walls are drying out. When the church doors are reinstalled the construction entrance will be removed. Next, we will need to mitigate the moisture problem. This area has been discussed with respective contractors. It will include re-pointing brick, cleaning and sealing the exterior brick (this process will require warmer weather). Also installing gutters on the Narthex to channel water away from the foundation. We are still in the process of getting quotes as well as other recommendations on how to slow down the moisture issues. Once this is completed the plaster will be reinstalled using wire mesh for better adhesion to the plaster. Then repaint the Narthex. We will keep you updated after all the information and quotes are in. We will consult with the Vestry for final approval for all repairs.

Exploring Outlines of the Faith

Candlemas

The Holy Day, The Feast of the Presentation, is one of the oldest feasts of the Christian church, celebrated since the 4th century AD. Other Christian names are the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Candlemas. Celebrations are observed on February 2, forty days after Jesus' birth. (*Luke, Chapter 2, verses 22-39*) tells us this was when Jesus was first presented in the temple in Jerusalem (*Book of Common Prayer, page 187*), to officially induct him into Judaism. The temple visit allowed Simon to hold the baby Jesus and called him "a Light for revelation" thus bringing the focus on light/candles to this Holy Day. Forms of observance include lighting and having candles blessed and the removal of Christmas decorations and nativities on Candlemas.

Prior to Christianity, people near the end of Winter, looked forward to Spring and planting, so many different cultures found ways to celebrate this shift from the cold and dark to happier times. As Christianity expanded, they too placed a festival of light around February 2.

February is derived from the Latin word februum. Translated it means purification because the month in ancient Rome was a time for purification. Derived from Februalia, which is the name of a Roman purification festival of Spring washing or cleaning that was held in February for three days beginning on the 13th and ending on the 15th. The change of the spelling of Februum to February came in the 15th century.

Modern sources have connected the Latin word for fever to the same word for purification or purging. This was because of the perspiration that is common with fevers and was viewed as a purging.
