





On Father's day, my mother's family had an annual reunion. This tradition began back in the 1920s when my great-aunts and uncles, the children of my mom's grandparents, began having an annual gathering. Some had moved to Richmond from Prince George County, Virginia and others to Northern Virginia or Washington D.C. Nowadays some come from even further places. Last year two first cousins came, one from San Antonio, Texas, and one from St. Paul, Minnesota and this year one came from near Savannah, Georgia. The reality is that I often have no clue who some of these "relatives" are because they may be third cousins twice removed or something like that. The original family names are Clary, Fenner, Butts, and Figg; but due to marriages over the years, there is a host of other names. My mom, her brother and one of their cousins are now the only three grandchildren living from the original second generation.



One of the things that keeps this going is an interest in genealogy. Genealogy isn't something new that began with Ancestry.com. A number of organizations are based upon genealogy such as the Daughters of the American Revolution. But well before that, we can look in both the Old and New Testaments and find genealogies. Both Matthew and Luke went to the trouble of giving us a genealogy of Jesus. But these genealogies weren't just looking back in time in order to establish legitimacy, they were also pointing forward to the fulfillment of God's promises.

Christ Church Parish is rich in history, rich in family history. Hardly a week goes by that someone doesn't call or stop by interested in researching their family. Where most parishes have lost their records, Christ Church is fortunate to have our register of baptisms, marriages, and funerals from the 1600 and 1700s. It was Nigel's interest in his great grandfather five times removed (the Rev. Duel Pead) that brought him in contact with us all the way from England. The Rev. Duel Pead having been our third priest back in the late 1600s.

Speaking to people interested in their past is also an opportunity to witness to them about the importance of their ancestor's faith, the importance of the church in

community, and how that has now been handed down to them to carry on that faith in Jesus Christ. Those parish registers are like family Bibles because, by virtue of our baptism, everyone listed in it is our sister and brother in Christ.

The parish register is still a very important part of our parish life. In it are still recorded baptisms, marriages, funerals, and confirmations. The ever-evolving parish register shows that our life as a parish isn't simply about the past but it is also about the future. We have to keep it going and we do that by inviting others to join us in our pilgrimage of faith.

The Endowment Board along with representatives from the Finance Committee, The Cemetery Committee, the Rector and The Vestry were very fortunate to welcome Arthur "Brink" Brinkley who is the Interim Executive Director of the Trustee of the Funds (ToTF). It was great to have Brink with us to outline where ToTF has been, where it is and where he hopes it to go.

A couple of things were pointed out that are of great interest. First, the fees we pay ToTF for investing our various accounts are remarkably low. He foresees changes at the Administrative level which will streamline much of what they do. The changes should allow for better, more frequent reporting & communications with account holders. This, hopefully, will also allow them to reduce fees even further. Mr. Brinkley foresees continued strong markets which should allow for further growth of our various funds. He did feel, however, that there will more than likely be a correction of some unknown magnitude within the next several years.

Chairperson Grace shares with us a letter from Nigel & it should be noted that this is coincidental to Fr. Stuart's opening article.

"Dear Grace,

I was delving deeply into the life of the Reverend Duel Pead's son, Duel Pead 2nd who was born in Virginia in 1687 and was also a priest. He lived to the ripe old age of 80 and was Rector of St. Michael's Church in Aveley, Essex for 55 years.

Joy of joy, like your lovely church, this splendid 12th-century church still exists. One of Reverend Duel Pead 2nd's parishioners was a certain Captain John Newton and his second wife Thomasina. In 1741 he baptized the Newton's son Thomas and in 1746 their daughter Thomasina, as recorded in the parish register.

The point is Captain John Newton, was also the father of John Newton, (1725–1807), a tortured soul who was an abolitionist having been heavily involved in the slave trade and later became an Anglican priest, he wrote "Amazing Grace" and "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken".

I love the link, however tenuous, between your beautiful church in Saluda, a fine Norman church in Essex and these two wonderful hymns.
