Growing Our Faith





CHRIST CHURCH ENDOWMENT GETS A LATE START

The footprint of Christ Church Parish dates back to a wooden church built in 1666. In fact, we celebrated our 350th anniversary with the Most Reverend Michael Curry conducting the service. Christ Church is rich in history with many distinguished members. One would think that surely, somewhere along the line there was an established endowment now valued in the millions.

Our endowment fund, currently valued at \$133,429.00, was established in 2011 to fund challenges and ministries for future generations beyond annual operating needs.

Prior to 2011, the church benefitted from generous members who supported ministries and improvements on a need basis. This kind of support is always welcome, but it does not set aside funds for future needs. In 2010, an Endowment Feasibility Committee was established to determine the feasibility of an endowment fund for Christ Church Parish. The vestry accepted the committee's recommendation and established the Christ Church Endowment Fund and the Endowment Board in 2011. The Endowment

The fund was established as a true endowment. The principle cannot be invaded except for dire emergency or major capital improvement. The Endowment Fund Board and the vestry have a fiduciary responsibility to ensure funds are managed wisely and distributed in accordance with established policy. The spending policy established there would be no distribution of earnings until the principle balance totals \$250,000.

Contributions **you make** will be allocated within one of the following six designations per your wishes:

- 1. Undesignated—Intended to be used where the need is greatest;
- 2. Church maintenance and historic preservation;
- 3. Worship and music;
- 4. Outreach and new mission;
- 5. Christian education of congregation and staff; and
- 6. Capital building for new or existing capital projects.

The Endowment Fund Board hosted a celebration for the Founding Circle members of the 1666 Society in January. Sixty-seven individuals qualified as Founder's Circle members of the 1666 Society by either making an outright gift to the Christ Church Endowment Fund or notifying the board that provisions have been made for the church or endowment fund in the indi-
