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



#### What is a “Principle Feast”?

There are seven Principle Feasts in the Church year. Principle Feasts are those days in the Church year that are often celebrated with a greater degree of preparation and enthusiasm. They mark key events in the life of Christ, the history of the Church, and the teaching of the Church. The two that first come to mind are Christmas and Easter, and I would guess that most Christians and non-Christians know these two feasts because they are often overshadowed by the secular commercialism that accompanies them.

The fixed principle feasts are **Christmas Day** (Dec. 25), **Epiphany** (Jan. 6), and **All Saints’ Day** (Nov. 1). The other principle feasts are based upon the movable date of **Easter** which is the first Sunday after the full moon that falls on or after Mar. 21. Ascension Day is celebrated on the Thursday forty days after Easter. The **Day of Pentecost** is the eighth Sunday after Easter, the fiftieth day of the Easter season. **Trinity Sunday** is then the Sunday after the Day of Pentecost, nine Sundays after Easter. A principle feast always takes precedence over any other observance.

On Sunday, June 9<sup>th</sup>, we will be celebrating one of these principle feast days: **THE DAY OF PENTECOST**. This major holy day, as described in the Book of Acts, commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of the risen Lord while they were gathered in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, which was the fiftieth day after Passover. Pentecost is often referred to as the birthday of the Church. We will celebrate this Sunday with red hangings (symbolizing the tongues of fire that rested upon the disciples’ heads). In addition to the hangings, members of the congregation are encouraged to wear red. This is also one of the appropriate times in the year to celebrate baptisms, and when there are no baptisms, for the congregation to renew their own baptismal vows. We fill the church on Christmas eve and we fill it on Easter Day, so why should these other principle feast days be any different? Let us come together June 9<sup>th</sup> with the same sense of joy and excitement that we had fifty days before on Easter morning. And then remember that the very next Sunday is Trinity Sunday, one of the other principle feasts.



We met on May 14 for our regular monthly meeting. We begin every meeting with a discussion about progress on our goals for the year. To “ensure clarity of committee missions”, we continue to collect mission statements for each committee. These will be posted on our bulletin board.

Towards another goal, “maximize community outreach”, the Outreach Committee sponsored “goodie bags” for the students at Christchurch School. Bags included labels wishing them “good luck” on their final exams. The students really appreciated this gesture, especially when one of our Vestry members guaranteed A's for their exams!

Reminder: Anyone requesting funds from the Vestry for over \$250 that has not been approved in the annual budget, must first submit a form (Request for Disbursement of Funds/Transfer of Funds) to the Finance Committee. Jack Hellems has copies of these forms.!

Thanks to all of you for your generous donations for Ellen Johnson. She was overwhelmed. With this, she was able to purchase a new (to her) red Saturn. She proudly drove her car to church so that we could all see and admire it. What a wonderful Church family we are!

### **Kitchen Projects Report**




Bobby Guillotte and I met on May 16<sup>th</sup> for “Demo and Remodel Day” in the kitchen pantry. We took the spice cabinet out and, in its place, we continued the five present 12” deep shelves on around and added a sixth at the bottom on the left. The purpose here is to get “stuff” up and off the floor. We are probably a little slow on the uptake here, but we just can’t have food on the floor nor can we have cleaning supplies, chemicals and other equipment mixed in with our pantry supplies and food. Spices have been put on one shelf on the left in alphabetical order as they are in the grocery store. We have attempted to sort things in the pantry in an orderly fashion that tries to make some sense of where it goes. All cleaning equipment is in the hall janitorial closet off the hallway now. The extra dishwasher chemicals have been moved

to the newly remodeled storage room.

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kitchen supplies as well as for the Brotherhood.

On Friday the 17<sup>th</sup>, Bobby Guillotte and Jeff Loustaunau met at my shop. The purpose here was to precut the 4x8 plywood to 2x8 shelves and to cut the 2x4s to 2x2s which were used as shelf supports. They were all pre-painted and allowed to dry. With all this material plus necessary



tools, we met at Church on Monday at 8:30 AM. Jack Tarran joined us at this time. Using the motto “Proper Prior Planning Prevents Poor Performance”, we re-evaluated our original plans, checked our measurements again and got to work! We determined that we were short a couple of pieces of 2x4 so we knocked off at about 4:00 PM knowing that we were well on our way. We started back at 8:30 AM on Tuesday. I brought the necessary lumber from my shop. We completed the project and loaded all materials by function (Housekeeping, kitchen, Brotherhood – these areas are identifiable by signage). You’ll note that the peninsula shelving is virtually empty at this point. It is reserved for Oyster Festival purchases as they begin to come in. Please leave this area open for that usage. Much of our materials are unboxed so we can see at a glance what we have in stock. Please note the black & yellow tape on the floor. It is there to signify a “no storage zone”. This is a fire issue and therefore, an insurance issue.

Honestly, we had WAY too much of some things and not enough of others. A very serious attempt is being made to standardize what we buy for all three areas. With that in mind, if you feel that we need something, please do not go out and buy it. Contact Robin Wells for kitchen supplies, Jeff McClelland for janitorial supplies and Jeff Loustaunau for all other purchases.

There are two other sets of shelving in the storeroom. They “belong”, primarily, to the ECW. The Junior Warden has asked them to come in and re-organize them so they (and we!) know what we have.

## "From the Verg"

Our recent confirmands read a book in preparation called Walk in Love, Episcopal Beliefs and Practices. It contains a wealth of well-presented information on our church services, the church year, and the meaning of many areas which cradle Episcopalian take for granted and newcomers must wonder about. I will try to bring light to some of these in periodic articles, using this terrific book.

One is our use of day services. Normally Old Testament readings and New Testament readings from the Gospels are read on a 3-year cycle. We are currently in Year C. If you attend church every single Sunday, you should hear almost all of the New Testament within that 3-



scripture in our Sunday services. Normally, we hear a reading, a Psalm, and a reading, and a reading. The scriptures cycle, A, B, and C. Year C. If you attend church every single Sunday, you should hear almost all of the New Testament within that 3-year cycle.

In Christ Church, one of our skilled lay readers reads the Old Testament, Psalm and New Testament from the middle desk of our pulpit, which is specifically designed for this use. Recently we have added a brief introduction to the readings to help us to understand the context of the lesson. Our readers practice the presentation of this material very seriously, with the hope that hearing it read well will make the story come alive. I think you can all tell when this is especially successful.

The Gospel is a very special case. We do a Gospel procession, led by the crucifer, with a Gospel Book Bearer holding the book high, and followed by our priest, all accompanied by a hymn. We stand to hear the Gospel, and we bring it into the midst of the people. The procession symbolizes the way that the Good News of God in Jesus Christ came into our world and does so today. Listen carefully as Christians have for centuries, and join those around the world in hearing the Word. Thanks be to God!

## Unconventional Worship Style Helps Congregations

Connect with Young Families

### MESSY + CHURCH

Two words that do not usually come to mind when you're thinking about worship in the Episcopal Church. But when St. Peter's in the Woods (Fairfax Station) was looking for a new way to offer worship that was especially geared toward families and young children, but welcoming to all, we saw the genius of Messy Church.

**what is Messy Church?** Messy Church began in 2004, when a church in Portsmouth, England, decided to get creative in their efforts to reach children and families with God's story. They came up with a fresh approach to whole family worship, offering monthly church on a day other than Sunday, and that included time for a shared meal, Bible-themed activities, music, and accessible worship. Today Messy Church is used by many denominations and in more than 20 countries.

The congregation of St. Peter's in the Woods realized that its families - like so many in our churches - were busy. Sunday mornings are not always the most convenient time to get everyone out of the house, up and dressed for Sunday School and worship. And our numbers were reflecting that reality. After discussion with our families, Sunday School teachers, and church leaders, we decided to give Messy Church a try - to reach not only our church families but people who might be new to the church.

Our families told us that a monthly Messy Church on a Saturday evening from 5:00 - 6:30 PM would be the best time. And so we began a season of preparation - culling Messy Church resources, visiting a Methodist church in Williamsburg to observe their Messy Church, planning and refining our version, and communicating the excitement we all felt about this new way of connecting people and God and church.

**what Does It Look Like?** We launched our first Messy Church in January 2018. Our sanctuary was transformed into six different stations boasting crafts, activities, service, and games related to our Epiphany theme, "Jesus is the Light of the World." We worked hard to promote the start of this new worship opportunity and were thrilled to see dozens of families and other curious parishioners stream in. The energy level was high as the kids moved from station to station. Parents joined in and found themselves enjoying conversation and making friends. Our Messy team members helped little fingers make the crafts and reinforce our theme of Jesus and light.

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A very Messy worship followed. We used a brief family-friendly liturgy and service of Holy Communion that I created especially for our Messy Church, using resources from the Bible Reading Fellowship and elsewhere. The kids were sprawled out on the floor, the parents nearby. It was noisy and raucous and oh so holy!

For me, that is one of the greatest gifts of Messy Church - creating a place for families to be together, as they are, knowing that God is in the midst of their messy and joyful chaos. We concluded our Messy Church with a family-friendly meal, generously coordinated, prepared and served by our Messy Kitchen Team (I.E. no pot luck!)

Since last January, our Messy Church has continued to take shape and grow. Parents tell us that their kids love it (they wish Church was always Messy!) and we've seen signs of God at work in our midst in whole new ways. Our Parish Administrator and Messy Team work faithfully to support the planning, activities, and meals. On the worship side, we work seasonal themes whenever we can, including a Messy Holy Week, a Messy All Hallow's Eve, and Messy Christmas.

For us, Messy Church has created a new way of worship for families and others looking to connect with God and the Church in new ways. We continue to work on Messy Church as evangelism, and hope to grow in reaching and welcoming people new to the Church

### **St. David's is Messy Too!**

Messy Church is church! Messy Church is intergenerational! Messy Church is fun! Messy Church was launched at St. David's, Ashburn, in 2018. Our goal is to transform lives through the intentional focus on joyful worship, lifelong learning, celebration of community and engaging outreach. The idea of Messy Church was introduced to St. David's by Rev. Janet Roberts of the St. Nicholas Vicarage in Liverpool, England, when she visited our church in the summer of 2016.

We looked imaginatively at the demographics of the community and the families who do not attend church. The idea of connecting people and meeting them wherever they are on their spiritual journey seemed exciting. Together with the Holy Spirit, a vision unfolded to develop new forms of discipleship that are better suited to the people who would come to Messy Church, most of whom are unchurched.

Most of the families that participate have pre-school aged children and do not regularly attend services. Some have been hurt by the church. Some find Sunday morning doesn't work for them.

Messy Church provides a space to gather in a relaxed atmosphere and connect with each other with a biblical theme through accessible hands-on worship, music, and fellowship with a shared meal. It is a sacramental environment with intentional learning and worship that is participatory and fun
