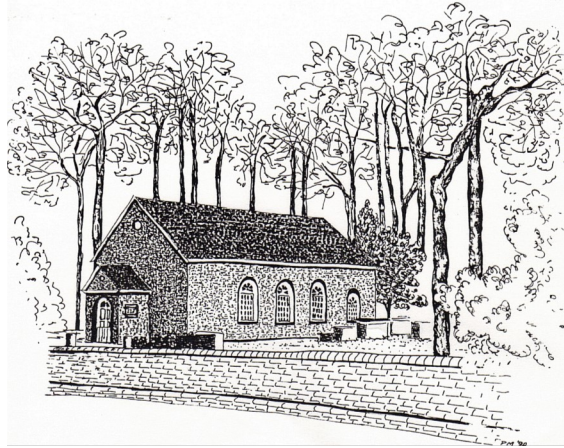

June Newsletter



When we closed our doors to in-person worship back in mid-March, it was inconceivable that we wouldn't be back in the church buildings for Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter. In just a few days we will be celebrating the next great feast day of the Church year, Pentecost, and we will still not be back in our buildings for in-person worship and fellowship. But just because our church's doors aren't open on Sunday mornings, it doesn't mean that our worship has ended and the work of the parish has stopped.

I have been amazed at the creativity that continues to make worship and ministry possible. Some of the posts that I have seen from friends and colleagues continually

remind us that the Church is not shut, so we are not planning for reopening. Yes, the church building is closed but the church is still very much in the business of sharing the love of God and caring for our neighbors. Our Sunday services have continued without interruption, the Vestry, Peg, and I continue to stay in contact with individuals and families by phone, I recently donated to Hands Across Middlesex for the food pantry from the Discretionary Fund that Dave Cryer told me would buy 15,000 pounds of food to feed people here in our county. Dr. Prichard has been creating talks for Christ Church Parish and St. George's, Arlington that we can listen to. Peg is now posting inspirational messages on our Facebook page. Mike Floyd, Lydia Dudley, and Pam McClelland are busy working on our new directory. Your Wardens are hard at work and our new parish administrator is rapidly learning and catching up on all the paperwork in the office.

One of the bishops from another diocese wrote that "our churches are not closed - we only closed our buildings. Our worship and prayer have continued night and day. No government can stop the prayers of the church. Nor can the coronavirus stop the

ministry of the church- for we are the Body of Christ, who rose from the dead!”

We did not simply close our buildings because the governor said that we should and we will not hastily reopen the buildings because the government says that we can. Our diocese closed our buildings because Jesus commands us to love our neighbor, to care for the most vulnerable in our communities, and to set an example of healthy living that others may follow. Walking in LOVE is not always easy but it is what God calls us to do.

There are now four tasks groups that have been set up in our diocese to develop plans and guidelines for safely reopening our buildings. It will be difficult moving into these new ways of gathering. Our church building is a small, close space which will make it a challenge to maintain proper distancing. The 10:30 service will most likely look and feel more like an 8:00 service with no singing. The offering plates won't be passed, the peace will be passed in word and with a wave of the hand or a slight bow, communion may not happen for a while or be only the bread. We may be asked to wear masks during the service. Whatever may come, we are still the people of God and followers of Christ and we continue to celebrate and practice our faith in ways that are truly life-changing.

Our project on the Great Room is proceeding nicely at this point. As has already been reported, the floor is totally rebuilt and ready for carpeting. In addition, the plaster repairs have also been completed, with a lot of repairs being made. The good news there is that we found no new areas of moisture problems or large areas of loose plaster. So, going forward, the walls and ceiling should remain in good shape.

The painters, Roger Hubbard and his wife Crystal, are hard at work and have completed the stage walls and ceiling. They will complete the rest of the area probably by Friday, June 5th. The new drop-ceiling and LED lights should also be completed around that timeframe. The new kitchen floor will be completed by then as well.

That will leave the carpeting to be done along with the baseboard installation to be completed the third week of June. As always, I will try to provide pictures and updates along the way.

As to the grounds, our groundskeeper, Jimmy Bristow will be working on weeding the beds along the front of the parish hall and killing the weeds in the parking areas surrounding the building. He has been keeping the lawns and cemetery in good shape this spring.

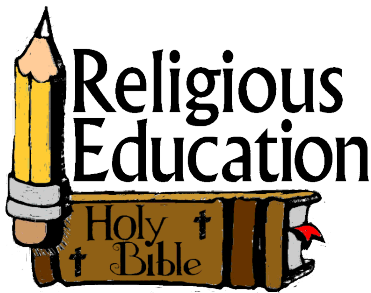


ONLINE WORSHIP SERVICES

There has been some feedback about confusion on the Christ Church web sight when folks do not use the options on the left side of the screen and see services on the right side of the page. The services mentioned on the right side of the page were “in church” services and have been cancelled. These have now been changed to show they are on Facebook. What you need to do is as follows:

- ◆ Go to CCP Web Site by clicking on this link—http://www.facebook.com/christchurch.parish/?view_public_for=1034815926571047. You can also highlight the link, copy it and then paste it into your browser.
- ◆ Under **Home** on the left side of the page, scroll to **+Worship Services at Christ Church Parish Prerecorded**.
- ◆ When the cursor hits this link it will turn **red** and will show a menu that will also be **red** of all the prerecorded services.
- ◆ The service of the day will not show up until the appointed time.
- ◆ You do not have to have a Facebook page to see the service or “attend”.
- ◆ One of the beauties of these virtual services is “you can be late getting to church” and not miss anything! And no one will stare at you!
- ◆ Also, you can go anytime you want after the appointed time.

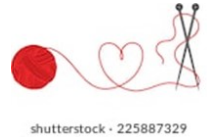

Not Mike Moore, but this is a neck gaiter.

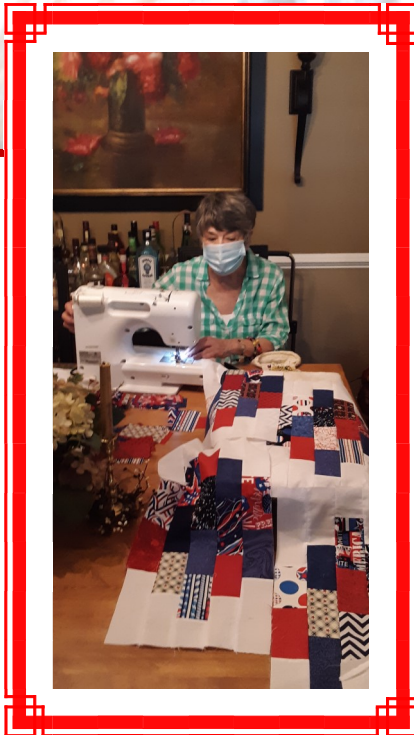

Appreciating the usage of Votive Candles

The altar guild is very diligent about making sure our votive candles are in place with plenty of wax. Recently, new votive candles were ordered that have a burning time of 10 hours. To decrease the likely hood of hot wax igniting paper in our trash can, the candles are extinguished after the service and allowed to cool.

Appreciating the usage of votive candles. Here, as in early Christian times, we light a candle before a statue or sacred image of our Lord or a saint. Of course, we do not honor the statue or the image itself, but whom that statue or image represents. The light signifies our prayer offered in faith coming into the light of God. With the light of faith, we petition our Lord in prayer or petition the saint to pray with us and for us to the Lord. The light also shows a special reverence and our desire to remain present to the Lord in prayer even though we may depart and go about our daily business.

Interestingly, in the Middle Ages, the symbolism of the votive candles was elaborated. St. Radegund (d. 587) described a practice whereby a person would light a candle or several candles which equalled his own height; this was called "measuring to" such a saint. Although it may seem peculiar to us, this "measuring" actually reflects the idea of the candle representing the person in faith who has come into the light to offer his prayer.

Also, some Medieval spiritual writers expanded the imagery of the candle itself: beeswax symbolized the purity of Christ; the wick, the human soul of Christ; and the light, His divinity. Also, the burning candle symbolized a sacrifice, which is made in both the offering of the prayer and the acceptance of the Lord's will.

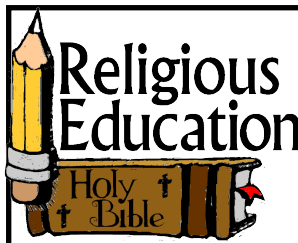
In all, the usage of votive candles is a pious practice which continues today in many Churches. The symbolism does remind us that prayer is a "coming into" the light of Christ, allowing our souls to be filled with His light, and letting that light burn on in our souls even though we may return to other activities.
