

Message From Our Rector



Greetings during this solemn and holy season of Lent.

Lent for clergy, altar and flowers guilds, and choirs can be a very busy season. Yes, Lent is a season when we are encouraged to slow down and pray, study, and do a self-examination of our lives. To hit the re-set button and to start anew. But the opposite is often true for those of us involved in

the different ministries of the church. For the altar guild there is silver to polish, linens to iron, and extra services to prepare for including Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil. The flower guild has to arrange the palms for Palm Sunday and receive the flower orders for Easter and then make the church ready for the Easter services. The choir has started having extra practices to get ready for Holy Week and Easter. And there are the Lenten suppers and programs to support. At times, Christ Church can be filled with tasks and activities that are at times either exciting or over-whelming – either way it keeps life interesting.

And that isn't all. On **March 10th at a JOINT 10:00 a.m. service**, Christ Church will have a bishop's visitation. Our last visit was in February 2022. This will be the first episcopal visitation of our new Diocesan Bishop, The Right Reverend E. Mark Stevenson, the XIV Bishop of Virginia

It will also be a day in which we will welcome a number of familiar faces officially into the Episcopal Church. Five are being Confirmed, two are being Received from the Roman Catholic Church, and one is going to do a re-affirmation of Confirmation. This will be the largest group of candidates that have been presented since I have been

Funding Christ Church Parish's Future By Contributing to The Endowment Fund

Millions of Americans make donations of cash and property to the charities of their choice each year. FROM THE ORGAN BENCH

Most people say Christmas is their favorite time of year. For me, it is Holy Week and Easter. I love the ancient traditions we continue to observe. I love the haunting music of Holy Week and the fanfare and bells of Easter. But the service that is my very favorite of the entire year is one that many have never experienced: The Great Vigil of Easter.

Yes, that is what it is properly called. If you have never been to one, please get up early Easter morning and come and see. Most churches do the vigil on Saturday evening. We chose to do it early Sunday morning. What to expect? Something totally different.

The Great Vigil of Easter is one of the oldest known rites of the Christian church, dating back to the second century. It brings worshippers, literally and symbolically, from darkness into light. We begin outside with the lighting of the "new fire" and the Pascal Candle. The greatest musical chant in our liturgy, The Exsultet, is then sung by the Deacon (thanks be that we have one and she is so talented and capable of doing this difficult piece justice). We proceed into the darkened church by candlelight. Then follow the readings from the Old Testament that tell

the story of how God has worked his wonders. How many? Nine are appointed in the Book of Common Prayer but as few as two may be read. We will compromise somewhere in between. (My church in DC did them all with anthems or hymns after each one - it was a LONG service but was always a full house.) Following the readings is either Baptism or Renewal of Baptismal Vows. The tradition of baptism at the vigil goes back to ancient times and is an integral part of the service. Then follows the Eucharist, sometimes known as the First Mass of Easter. At this point, the lights are brought up and the congregation sees the sanctuary in all its "Easter finery" for the first time. Bells ring and we sing our first Alleluias since the last Sunday of Epiphany.

Why get up at the crack of dawn, stand out in the cold, endure all those readings, and then come back in a few hours for another service? Because it is beautiful, it is meaningful, it is historic, it is different. For me, it is what Easter is all about: God's story and plan for our salvation. Try it, you might get hooked too.
