From Our Rector

Jesus said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. (Mark 6:31)

If that was the way it was in Jesus' day, just think how much more complicated lives have become in our world. Cell phones, text messages, email and the internet have made it even more difficult to cut ourselves off from the business of everyday life and find a deserted place to be all by ourselves and rest a while. I can just imagine Jesus returning from one of his retreats and having people say, "Why didn't you answer your cell phone?" "Couldn't you have just taken a moment to

answer my text message or email?" if it had happened in our own day. But when we are truly trying to experience a time of rest and spiritual renewal, each little interruption is like hearing an out-of-tune note on a piano or the proverbial fingernails scraping across the blackboard, and the peace that we truly need is shattered by the world.

"Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, he (Jesus) got up, went out, and made his way to a deserted place; and there he was praying. Simon and his companions searched for him, and when they found him, they said, 'Everyone is looking for you.'" (Mark 1:35-37)

We then learn that these weren't isolated retreats: "But the news about him spread even more, and large crowds, would come together to hear him and to be healed of their sicknesses. Yet he often withdrew to deserted places and prayed." (Luke 5:15-16)

Hopefully, you are seeing a pattern of life that Jesus is setting for us as an example for living. Just think about the plumber who has come to clean out the stopped-up drain. The plumber reports, "No wonder your drain was stopped up. It was full of grease, hair, solid food, sticks, a ring, and a small toy. With all that in there, it was no way that anything could get through." When we fail to take time, as Jesus did, to spend time apart and pray, we will find that the Holy Spirit has a difficult time speaking to us. There is just too much noise and distractions keeping us from hearing what God is trying to say to us.

With that in mind, one part of the Clergy / Parish Letter of agreement states that after a period of seven (7) years, a three (3) month sabbatical leave for the Rector shall be provided. During this time, the Rector will receive full compensation and benefits. The sabbatical should be uninterrupted by the daily work of the Church (e.g., a three-month sabbatical should not be taken as six weeks in the spring and six in the fall, but 12 continuous weeks). Planning for the sabbatical leave shall begin at least one year advance, with the objectives clearly stated and agreed to by the Vestry and the Rector.

I began my seventh year with Christ Church Parish on the first of October. Since planning for the sabbatical needs to begin at least one-year in advance, the Vestry at the October Vestry meeting approved my taking a sabbatical for three months beginning, September 2022 through November 2022. You will hear more about my plans as they develop over the coming year. One of my hopes is to travel to Scotland and England and walk the St. Cuthbert Way pilgrimage which, is about 62 miles, visit Canterbury Cathedral, and visit London exploring our Anglican heritage.

As I begin making plans for creating a time of retreat, prayer, and spiritual renewal for myself, I pray that you, too, will follow our Lord's example and spend time with him in personal reflection and renewal.

Catechísm Corner

Mission: A small corner of faith, understanding and education



Last year I gave you the recipe for Scripture Cake, hoping you might be able to make a fun and educational project with it with young people around for the holidays. One intrepid family did just that, but I know many of you had to forego your family time last year in order to safeguard the health of your loved ones. SO, I was so sure this would be a big hit if you tried it, I'm offering it again. If you get stuck on any ingredient, just let me know, and I will share the secret code!

If you are lucky enough to have young children around for this Advent season, this can be a fun activity to figure out and prepare during the Advent Season. Recipes of this sort were very popular at quilting and sewing bees in the 1800. Maybe you're feeling like me and thinking we are homebodies and isolated. We have time for this! Your young helpers will find out where to find books of the Bible, and you'll enjoy a delicious cake at the end. How good is that!?

Scripture Cake

I cup Psalms 55:21 (use either or both)

2) 2 cups Jeremiah 6:20 (last part of the verse)

6 Job 39:14

3 tablespoons 1 Samuel 14:25

¹/₂ cup Judges 4:19 (first sentence)

4 ¹/₂ cups 1 Kings 4:22 (first part of verse)

2 teaspoons Leviticus 2:13

2 teaspoons Amos 4:5

2 Chronicles 9:9 (1/2 teaspoons each of cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg)

2 cups Numbers 17:8 chopped

2 cups both things in 1 Samuel 30:12, chopped (4 cups total)

Mix in a larger bowl in order given, beating in eggs until light and fluffy. Add the last two ingredients by hand. Following Solomon's advice for making a good boy (Proverbs 23:13) and you will have a good cake. Bake at 250 degrees for 2 ½ hours in 4 small "bread pans" buttered. Allow to cool in pans, on their sides, on a rack. Turn out cakes. You COULD wrap them in cheesecloth soaked with sherry or any whiskey. And you could share them...just saying...

Wishing you a blessed Advent as we wait and await.

Sursum Corda (lift hearts) "Lift up your hearts"

In our Eucharistic service, as we move from hearing the word of God to the Eucharistic Prayer, we shift gears with the *Sursum Corda*.

It is an important part of our theology, and it connects us with the ancient liturgies. The *sursum* corda is an act of active worship; it is an act of reaching for God: "Let us lift up our hearts...to God in heaven,"(Lamentations 3:41)

We need the sursum corda in our worship because it:

* has been used in Christian worship since at least 215 A.D.

* captures the biblical idea of worship being an ascent into God's presence in heaven.

"Lift up your hearts!" "We lift them up to the Lord!" (....silently I suggest you think about "in heaven")

You'll hear this dialog in many Christian Liturgies. The highly focused words of the sursum corda are

some of the most beautiful, heart-moving words we speak. They express the longing of the soul in this mortal world for the wholeness of honoring heaven, acknowledging our worship is a heavenly one. So we are summoned as worshipers to lift up our hearts and be heavenly-minded by seeking Jesus and the Father in heaven.

This is the point in the liturgy in which celebrant and people covenant together to make eucharist (to give thanks to God). The celebrant begins by calling the people to lift up their hearts. When the people agree by saying, "We lift them to the Lord," the celebrant rephrases the request in the first-person plural--no longer "[You all in the congregation] lift up your hearts," but "Let **us** give thanks to the Lord." The people confirm that would be "right," and then all join in the Sanctus.

"A MISSING MEN AND WOMEN TABLE"

"The Missing Men and Women Table" consists of a small, round bistro table, a white tablecloth, a single place setting, an inverted wine glass, a salt shaker, a slice of lemon on a bread plate with a pile of spilled salt, a bible, a small bud vase with a RED ribbon tied around it containing a single long stem red rose, a lit candle, and an empty chair.

The table is round to show our everlasting concern for our missing men and women. The tablecloth is white, symbolizing the purity of their motives when answering the call to duty. The single red rose, displayed in a vase, reminds us of the life of each of the missing and their loved ones and friends who keep the faith, awaiting answers. The vase is tied with a red ribbon, symbolizing our continued determination to account for our missing. A slice of lemon on the bread plate is to remind us of the bitter fate of those captured or missing in a foreign land. The spilled salt symbolizes the tears endured by those missing and their families who seek answers. The Bible represents the strength gained through faith to sustain those lost from our country, founded as one nation under God. The glass is inverted to symbolize their inability to share this day's toast. The lit candle symbolizes the upward reach of their unconquerable spirit. The chair is empty because they are missing.

Now, set their table and observe a moment of silence to honor them, America's POW/MIAs, and to the success of our efforts to account for them. Now that you know, you can never forget!

The comments below from Nigel James Mac-Fall were sent to Grace Parker on October 8 after watching our Blessing of the Animals service online from his home in England.

"Dear Grace,

Last Sunday's service was an absolute hoot, most enjoyable, we don't get anything like that, I can imagine it was quite a challenge keeping order but under the benevolent eye of Father Stuart, the animals seemed remarkably well behaved, bless them.

I may be 3,698 miles from Christ Church, Saluda but the transmission of the services just gets better and better, congratulations to Mike Floyd and his colleagues, the church always looks stunning and I love the flower arrangements, were those white orchids behind the altar?... Nigel" (shared with his permission)

For those who may not know or have forgotten, Nigel Mac-Fall is a great-grandson five times removed of the Rev'd Deuel Pead, one of the first Anglican priests in the area. Rev'd Pead was the third rector of Christ Church Parish during 1683-1690. His portrait hangs near the front door of our Parish Hall. Nigel paid a historic visit to Christ Church Parish in 2016. You can read more about that visit on our website. He continues to remain connected and engaged with us through email and takes advantage of zoom opportunities, including Bob Prichard's Lenten Lecture series earlier this year. Clearly, Nigel also follows our live-streamed/recorded services.

We truly do love seeing many people in church *IN PERSON*! But we are also grateful for feedback on our online ministry, which you can only provide in a meaningful way if you've actually watched an online service. Whether or not you attend in person, if you have never seen any of our online services, we hope you will take a few minutes to watch at least one recorded example. All recordings remain accessible through our Facebook page and YouTube channel. Be assured that the production team is continually working on ways to avoid the occasional technical glitch that can arise from time to time – for example, a microphone needing volume adjustment. But if you watch a recording and see something you'd like to comment on, please feel free to speak up.

Fr. Stuart was doing a masterful job of producing his own recorded services for over a year. New state-of-the-art technology brought to the church in early 2021 was funded in part by a Mustard Seed Grant from the Diocese of Virginia. The Tech Team's skill with optimizing video production has increased dramatically since the team's first recorded service on Palm Sunday 2021, significantly freeing up Fr. Stuart's time to focus on his numerous other responsibilities. Live streaming was added a few weeks after that.

Some have asked about viewer statistics. When we have more time to assemble the data and analyze trends, these numbers will be reported in a future newsletter. What is already certain is that encouraging comments like Nigel's are coming from many distant locations, and not all who watch our services are members of Christ Church Parish. This new online ministry has already had positive impacts on our church beyond what we had imagined.

THE FIRST THANKSGIVING WAS IN VIRGINIA

On September 16, 1619, the "Good Ship Margaret" with 35 settlers, including Captain John Woodlief, sailed to Virginia. It took 2 ½ months to cross the stormy Atlantic Ocean and arrive in the Chesapeake Bay. Captain Woodlief then moved the ship up the King James River, and on December 4, as noted in the company journal, *"The men were rowed ashore, placed their personal luggage on the hard ground, gazed at the woods enclosing them and listened to the complete silence. Then, at a command from Captain Woodlief, with which they were profoundly stirred to comply, the homesick men knelt on the dried grass to pray*". Captain Woodlief prayed: *"We ordaine that this day of our ships arrival, at the place assigned for plantacon, in the land of Virginia, shall be yearly and perpetually kept holy as a day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God."*

The contractor, The Berkeley Company, had given a specific list of ten instructions to the settlers when they departed England. *The very first instruction was upon landing that they give a prayer of Thanksgiving for their safe voyage and to do so annually and perpetually thereafter.*

America's first official English-speaking Thanksgiving had just occurred, one year and seventeen days before the Pilgrims landed in Massachusetts and almost two years before the Pilgrims held a three-day Harvest Feast which is commonly considered to be the first Thanksgiving. In the early days, the celebration of Thanksgiving was strictly a religious experience, focused entirely on prayer.
