

Message From Our Rector



Alleluia! Christ Is Risen! Alleluia!

We are an Easter people. We know that on the third day the tomb was empty and that Jesus was raised from the dead. But the events of Thursday night and Friday had changed the lives of Jesus' disciples and followers. They were frightened, confused and emotions were all over the place. They thought that Jesus was the Messiah, but if that were true, then why was he lying dead in a tomb? They thought that they would have a key role in ushering in the Kingdom of God that Jesus was

proclaiming. Those hopes were crucified with Christ. Now what?

From the Organ Bench

Hymns - When We Sing Them

The Book of Common Prayer does not say we must sing hymns - it says we MAY sing hymns. Specifically, it says "A hymn, Psalm or anthem may be sung". But when?

We call it the "four hymn sandwich". The BCP tells us we may sing a hymn at these places in the Holy Eucharist (the Daily Office is a whole different ballgame).

1. At the beginning of the Eucharist.

We call this the Processional Hymn as we use it for the procession of the clergy, choir, and servers into the sanctuary.

2. Sequence Hymn

Next is the optional hymns during the reading of the lessons. The prayer book says, "A hymn, psalm or anthem may follow each reading". We only do one following the Epistle reading. It is called the Sequence Hymn and is used for the Gospel procession. I have seen this incorrectly called the Gradual. That hymn would be the one between the OT reading and the Psalm, which we don't do.

3. Offertory hymn or anthem

Up next is the Offertory, at which point the Book says, "During the Offertory, a hymn, psalm or anthem may be sung". Nowhere does it say, "The choir sings an anthem, then everyone stands while we sing the Doxology." That was a mid-20th century inclusion from other less liturgical denominations.

4. Communion or post-communion hymn

We are given the option of singing during communion. Specifically, it says "During the ministration of Communion, hymns, psalms, or anthems may be sung". Another rubric in a different place says, "A hymn may be sung before or after the post-communion prayer." We have chosen this post-communion option given the small number of people who were singing during communion. Instead, we use it during the time the deacon is finishing up.

That is actually it for the directions given. The BCP makes no mention of a hymn at the end of the service. So, we give the Benediction, tell folks we are done, and then sing 12 more stanzas while they are itching to get to brunch! I would be delighted to see the demise of the Recessional Hymn, and I am not alone - it seems I am in good company.

Eminent liturgist Marion Hatchett was a leader in the development of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer.

Hatchett writes that the Rubrics Committee did not mention a closing or recessional hymn because it thought that the rite would be more effective without one. The Postcommunion prayers all suggest an immediate movement into the world. Then comes the dismissal, which, by definition, sends the Church forth. Hatchett writes that the action – the leaving – should come immediately without further words and songs. When the Rubrics Committee did not put in a rubric allowing a closing hymn, they imagined that there would not be one, yet closing hymns are very common, and Hatchett saw them as contrary to the solid theology of the Eucharist that informed the rubrics: The Eucharist sends us out, so the rite should reflect that.

Amen, I say!



Do you know what a Coventry Cross is?

During our pastoral visit on March 10th, The Rt. Rev. E. Mark Stevenson, the Bishop of Diocese of Virginia, celebrated confirmations, receptions, and reaffirmation of several beloved members of our congregation: confirmation is a sacrament reserved for the Bishop, and, therefore, special and definitely not frequent. As part of that, we, the people of Christ Church, gifted these members with two items: a Book of Common Prayer, a book which we use every Sunday, and which contains our bedrock beliefs and practices...and a cross.

What cross did we give? It is called a Coventry Cross. These particular crosses were given to us by Nigel Mac-Fall of London, whose great-grandfather, 5 times removed, was our 3rd rector in the 1600's. We have given these as a very special gift to our last few classes of confirmands.

So, a Coventry Cross is...what?

From Nigel: A wonderful symbol of reconciliation at the height of adversity. The devastating Blitz attack of 14 November 1940 on Coventry almost wiped the city out, and Coventry Cathedral was completely destroyed. The following morning, the Rector of St. Marks was sifting through the cathedral ruins and discovered three large medieval nails which he bound together in the shape of a cross. Therefore...a Coventry Cross. Do take a moment to look at these as you see them worn with gratitude and love. We are so fortunate to have these crosses and this connection.
