MORNING PRAYER

Episcopal Morning Prayer is a structured form of worship rooted in the traditions of the Episcopal Church, designed to begin the day with scripture, prayer, and reflection. It's part of what's called the Daily Office, a rhythm of prayer services that mark different times of the day.

The service typically includes:

- Opening sentences from scripture
- A confession of sin
- Psalms and scripture readings
- Canticles (hymn-like passages from the Bible)
- The Apostles' Creed
- A series of prayers and collects (short prayers that gather the themes of the day)
- And often, a time for personal intercession and thanksgiving

It can be led by clergy or laypeople and is often used both in churches and by individuals at home. The structure helps center the day in spiritual practice and reflection




WELCOME SHERRI McDEARMON



The Relationship shared by "The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America" and Our Church

In 1892 Frances Bellamy wrote a 23-word lyric, which was published in the "Youth's Companion" magazine. On October 12, 1892, the Pledge to the Flag was said for the first time by 12 million school children across the country. The original pledge to the flag was: "I pledge allegiance to my Flag and to the Republic for which is stands, one Nation, indivisible with Liberty and Justice for all."

It was later noted that there might be some confusion about the words "my Flag." The wording was changed to "the Flag of the United States." The following year, the words changed again to "the Flag of the United States of America". The last change in the Pledge of Allegiance occurred on June 14,1954, Flag Day, when the words "under God" were added. There is no comma between "one nation" and "under God." Why is this important? We are "one nation under God," a single concept, not two independent thoughts. There is no separation between our country and our God.
