From Rev. Randi Hicks Rowe, Priest in Charge

I appreciate all the help everyone is giving me to settle in and get to know the community. Christ Church is a welcoming church for its priests and potential new members. Indeed, as I've talked with many of you, I've discovered that you became members here because of the welcome you received on your first visit. Our gifts of hospitality and welcome are a great testament to the love of God.

I want to discuss one new initiative we are trying to reach out to our neighbor, Christchurch School. Beginning this month, we'll host a Taizé service at 7 p.m. on the second Sunday of each month during the school year. The service is aimed at the students; however, it will be open to anyone. Several of our folks have agreed to provide music for this service; the plan is for student musicians to join with us.

Taizé worship gets its name from the little village of Taizé, which is in the Burgundy region of France. Brother Roger Louis Schuz-Marsauche founded the village and set up a monastery there in the 1940s. The monastic community contains brothers from various countries who meet three times a day to worship.

Worship in the community is characterized by repetitive prayer chants in which the community participates. In the community of Taizé, the chants are in Latin, with choruses in various secular languages. The worship also includes moments of reflective silence and brief readings of Scripture. Many people, including about 10,000 young adults (18 to 30) annually, make pilgrimages to Taizé to join in its worship.

Taizé services outside the monastery don't precisely replicate the worship experience, but they are similar. Our service will begin by inviting each participant to light a candle as they pray for a particular private concern. Then, the service will include five chants led by the musicians, with all worshippers participating. A student will read a Scripture passage at two points in the service, and we'll observe some silence. Initially, all of our chants will be in English, although we may use some simple Latin chants in the future. Many chants we will use are now well-known in the United States; some are included in Wonder, Love, and Praise, a supplement to our hymnal. Those in WLP are "O'Lord Hear My Prayer" and "Laudate omnes gentes."

We will also offer pizza for the students after the service. I appreciate the Brotherhood and ECW's willingness to support this venture. Once we get past the initial few months, we may be able to get a grant to cover the pizza.



Mid-week Eucharist

Please remember that we have a midweek Eucharist here at Christ Church. The service is at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday mornings and is celebrated in the Chapel in the Parish Hall.

This year, we expect a record crowd partly due to the fact we have enlisted award-winning author, biographer, and historian Ms. Heath Hardage Lee to discuss her book, The League of Wives: The Untold Story of the Women Who Took on the U.S Government to bring their husbands home from Vietnam. This event is an especially important event that highlights Christ Church Parish's dedication to our Veterans. Events such as this one take a tremendous amount of time, effort, and money to undertake, so any and all monetary donations would be gladly accepted to help defray some of the costs involved in producing this event.

The Vestry and I personally thank all the Christ Church Parishioners for your support of both very important events.

"Double Benefit" Tax Strategy

Have you invested in land that has appreciated? Will you face a capital gains tax when it is sold? You may be able to offset some of that tax.

Think about giving a portion of the property (before the sale) to the church endowment rather than writing a check after the sale. By doing so, you might receive two benefits. First, you could receive an income tax deduction for the value of the gift. Second, you could avoid capital gains tax on the portion of the property given to charity. You might be pleased with the "double benefit" from giving the property and your church receiving a very nice gift.

Is a part gift and part sale right for you?

A part gift and part sale of an appreciated asset can be an excellent tax strategy. You can use the deduction from the gift portion to offset the capital gains from the sale portion of the transaction. Consult your tax adviser if you want to learn more about part gift and part sale strategies.


Our ECW and Brotherhood will provide pizza for the students after the service. What an exciting outreach effort with our closest neighbor.

Set Your Veterans Day and Thanksgiving Apart From Others Set a "A MISSING SERVICE MEMBER TABLE"



"The Missing Service Member Table" consists of a small, round bistro table, a white tablecloth, a single place setting, an inverted wine glass, a saltshaker, a slice of lemon on a bread plate with a pile of spilled salt, a bible, a small bud vase with a RED ribbon tied around it containing a single long stem red rose, a lit candle, and an empty chair.

The table is round to show our everlasting concern for our missing men and women. The white tablecloth symbolizes the purity of their motives when answering the call to duty. The single red rose, displayed in a case, reminds us of the life of each of the missing and their loved ones and friends who keep the faith, awaiting answers. The vase is tied with a red ribbon, symbolizing our continued determination to account for our missing. A slice of lemon on the bread plate reminds us of the bitter fate of those captured or missing in a foreign land. The spilled salt symbolizes the tears endured by those missing and their families who seek answers. The Bible represents the strength gained through faith to sustain those lost from our country, founded as one nation under God. The inverted glass symbolizes their inability to share this day's toast. The lit candle symbolizes the upward reach of their unconquerable spirit. The chair is empty because they are missing.

Now, set their table and observe a moment of silence to honor them, America's POW/MIAs, and the success of our efforts to account for them. Now that you know, you can never forget!

November Anthems

We begin the month with All Saints Sunday. The choir will sing "How Lovely is Thy Dwelling Place" by Daniel Kellman. Based on a paraphrase of Jonathan Asprey's Psalm 84, this setting uses the tune "The Homes of Donegal," a traditional Irish ballad.

Our Nov 10th anthem, A Woman and a Coin, is based on the Gospel reading of the parable of the lost coin. Monica Menendez adds her lovely flute music to this enchanting piece.

The Old Testament reading for Nov 17 is about Hannah, the mother of Samuel. Our anthem, A New Magnificat, is a duet of Hannah and Mary, each singing their song of praise to God. One of our primary missions as a committee is to reach out to, include, and integrate the greater community into our activities and events.

With recent dual local newspaper articles on the successful Marine Corps Run that commemorates the passing of Lieutenant General Lewis "Chesty "Puller on October 10, 1971, the Committee was able to showcase approximately 240 able-bodied young Marine Recruits, the official welcome by our clergy, The Reverend Randi Rowe and The Reverend Bob Prichard, stories shared with the Marines in our historic cemetery and then capping off the morning with our committee serving the Runners snacks, soft drinks and coffee. The community could observe and cheer on the Runners along the route from Norman's Produce, past the General's home in Saluda, and then onward to Christ Church Parish, where all were invited to observe the ceremony.

On 10 November, all are invited to meet and greet the acclaimed author, Ms. Heath Lee, who will deliver an electrifying overview of her book, The League of Wives, and discuss the wives' role in affecting change in the prisoner policies of the Vietnam War. The book focuses on creating and implementing policies to bring home US Aviators shot down over Vietnam and servicemen held in captivity.

Ms. Lee has devoted her time to visit with us for two days and will give a presentation on the Vietnam war, the cultural shift at that time and the power of collective voices as we celebrate our Veterans Day Luncheon at Christ Church Parish on Monday, November 11th in our Parish Hall.

The Luncheon is open to all Middlesex County Veterans, and we will feature our new video of Middlesex County Veterans honoring both our parish member Veterans and Veterans from across the county.

These major events are free to the public, but donations to help cover these costs are greatly appreciated.

December 4th brings us together again for our themed Advent Dinner, which will shine a spotlight on Austria and her gift to the world: the song "Silent Night."

December 24th the Fellowship Committee will serve hot tea and cider immediately after our Christmas Eve service outside the doors of our church. Please come and join us!!!

Our final event of the season is Epiphany on January 6th. The large blaze of dried Christmas trees and holiday greens gives a spectacular ending to the holiday season and signals new beginnings in our church and personal lives.
